Consecration of Lodge No.5 Jeanne d'Arc (France) 1916

Jeanne d'Arc Lodge No.5 France

No history of Jeanne d'Arc Lodge No.4168 can be written without reference to Jeanne d'Arc Lodge No.5, Grande Loge Nationale Independent et reguliere pour la France et les Colonies Francaises.

In 1916, members of the Craft serving with the British Army in France, stationed at Rouen, conceived the plan of founding a Masonic Lodge. They wished to form a lodge to become a meeting place for Freemasons passing to and from the Front Lines. Many preliminary meetings were held to consider the matter and one brother going home on leave was tasked with making enquires at UGLE. He met with Sir Edward Letchworth, the Grand Secretary and was informed a new lodge could not be formed under the United Grand Lodge of England as there was a Grand Lodge of France duly recognised by United Grand Lodge of England under the title of Grande Loge Nationale Independent et Reguliere pour la France and advised that an application should be made to that body.

Back in France a meeting was held in September 1916 attended by forty six known Freemasons in the Rouen area. And after much discussion it was unanimously agreed to apply to the Grande Loge Nationale, France, for a warrant to form a Lodge. The name of the Lodge was chosen as Jeanne d'Arc a name that had many historical associations with Rouen. Lengthy correspondence followed with the Provincial Grand Secretary of the Province of Neustrie, in which the Province of Rouen is situated. Ultimately the application was approved. The next difficulty was finding a suitable meeting place and finally the management of the Grand Hotel du Nord provided accommodation in the upper part of the hotel. While this was going on the brethren were busy making furniture for the Lodge, such as pedestals and working tools.

The Lodge was finally consecrated on the 16th December 1916.

Right Worshipful Brother Charles Barrios, Provincial Grand Master of Neustrie, attended and constituted the Lodge and Very Worshipful Brother M D Nicholson, Grand Treasurer was the Consecrating Officer.

Altogether there were 107 founders from all parts of the British Empire and Worshipful Brother John R Walker, Past Master of the City of London Lodge No.901 was Installed as the first Worshipful Master. He then appointed the following Officers.

The first regular meeting was held on the fourth Thursday in January 1917 and meetings were then held on the fourth Thursday of every month. During the first year there were so many emergency meetings the Lodge actually met every Thursday and even on some Sunday afternoons for conferring the Third Degree. It was common for five or six members to be initiated, passed or raised at the same meeting. It is recorded that during a period of just over twelve months there were fifty eight meetings at which ninety three candidates were initiated, of which sixty six of them were passed and raised. There were also twenty two joining members. The appointed Secretary had to enlist the assistance of other brethren to help him keep the records up to date and maintain contact with the members.

During the first year the initiation fee was two hundred francs and included the first year's subscriptions of thirty francs.

During the second year the Lodge held forty one meetings at which fifty one candidates were initiated and forty five passed and raised. In May 1918 the Worshipful Master gave notice that no further proposals for initiations, other than those of civilians would be accepted after the regular meeting of the 27th June 1918. For some reason this did not happen as the summons for the regular November 1918 meeting contained the names of forty candidates to be balloted for as initiates all of who were military.

The high volume of work continued into the third year, which saw forty three candidates initiated and fifty five passed and raised during thirty meetings. By the end of 1919 attendance at meetings had dropped considerably owing to demobilisation. 1920 saw W.Bro H Hunt become the last of the military brethren and original founders to occupy the Master's Chair and it is noted that after he left the Lodge, British Military uniform was seldom seen again.

The first civilian Master, the Rev Charles S Painter, was installed in 1921. Gradually the founders of No.5 Lodge France and those who had been initiated in it began to return home. Many kept up their membership for a short time and several continued as active members of the Lodge.

The Consecration

The Consecration took place at the Cecil Hotel, Strand, London commencing at 4.30pm with V.W.Bro P.Colville-Smith Grand Secretary as the Consecrating Officer, assisted by:

W.Bro Edmund Heish had been due to act as Consecrating Officer of No.5 France but had to withdraw at the last moment due to a family bereavement.

During his address the Consecrating Officer said they had gathered together to consecrate a Lodge that was unique in history and credit was due to its overseas members for banding themselves together under such circumstances. He thought it would be the means of drawing the two countries still closer together.

Bro Chaplain gave the following Oration:

"The name of an English lodge is frequently significant of its origin, or some special quality or class of persons connected with it. It is rare, as we might suppose, to have the name of a woman in this connection, yet it is not so rare as generally believed. Two goddesses gave their appellation, Iris and Minerva. I must say an exquisite contract, the smiling goddess, clad in the rainbow, who played a part in Homer's Iliad, set against the stern-visaged and stony-hearted Minerva, clad in all the panoply of war. Of women we have several of antiquity who are known as saints, of which there are twelve Maries, Bridget or Bride, Catherine, Mary Magdalene and Sancta Maria, though this is probably taken from the name of the hospital to which it is attached. Three Anne's, Cecilia (dedicated to music), Cuthberga, four Helenbsssss and warburga. Of Queens we have fifteen Victorias, a Kaisar-i-Hind, reminiscent of Indian politics, Queen Alexandra and Queen Mary, two duchesses of Portland and York, one half mythical person, Rowena and last the names of two women destined to play a considerable part in the history of the world, who have displayed moral qualities of the highest excellence, who have been leaders of men with varying success and whose lives, devoted as they were to their purpose, exhibited the deepest tragedy. Their names are Boadicea and Jeanne d'Arc. It is the latter name which has been chosen by the founders of this Lodge as the title, one with which they will ever be associated and one therefore, we must take into account to-day in what we have to say. Jean of Arc, a simple French girl, born in the country town of Domremi, had no doubt witnessed and experienced, the terrible evils her beloved country was suffering from the constant wars, especially those which the English encouraged and took part in and she brooded over them in her isolated position. From the age of thirteen she heard voices and believed, as a true patriot, that she had been destined by God to be the deliverer of her country from both the civil and foreign enemies of the King, the Burgundians and the English. The evident conviction she had in her Heaven-sent

mission, her enthusiasm and the attributes of genius which she displayed, arrested the attention of Dauphin and his military chiefs and in spite of the considerable hostility which was offered by the Dominican Order and generally by the ecclesiastical element, she was admitted into the army amongst the chiefs and was received by the ranks with enthusiasm, for it gave them the stimulus hitherto wanting in their contests. The result was immediate. The siege of Orleans was raised, a stern moral discipline was established on her initiative and the soldiers, under her leading, gained victory after victory which cleared the way to Rheims, the ancient coronation place of the Frankish kings and she had the satisfaction of beholding Charles her king duly crowned in that place. Thus were her two ambitions fulfilled and the mission with which she believed herself entrusted accomplished. She attempted to bring about other necessary results, conceived in true statesmanlike vision, but found herself opposed and thwarted by those very persons who should have been filled with gratitude for what she had effected. Captured by her enemies and sold to the English, she was condemned as a sorceress and heretic by her own church, in the true spirit of the age and was executed by being burnt alive in the market-place of Rouen. We cannot be blind to the responsibility of the English leaders, the Duke of Bedford and his party, for their share in this tragedy, which was not only a grim but savage and unworthy revenge. The fate of Jeanne d'Arc and the part she played at a critical period of European history has come down to us and remained a luminous picture of the past and she, like Boadicea, has deservedly become a heroine of history. The church which hated and condemned her has placed her in the ranks of those distinguished persons called saints, she is regarded a patroness of France and accepted in England as a true heroine, deserving our tribute of homage to her work and her qualities and now that her name becomes the title of this Lodge may not the event be of considerable significance in the future. The two nations, France and England, the old antagonists of the Middle Ages, have been drawn together by a common war, by the direst of struggles in that war, where they fought side by side with equal heroism, have suffered in common all the calamities which arose in consequence, have formed in their common action and mutual respect the beginning which is equally necessary for both if they are to preserve their existence and first-class powers and will not such a name a Jeanne d'Arc common to two lodges each under its own sovereign jurisdiction, as Grand Lodges, have a considerable influence in drawing the bond closer? Will not the contemplation of the sterling Masonic qualities of the Maid of Orleans – her spiritual tone, her courage, her purity, her altruism, her patriotism, her love and devotion to the suffering and distressed – influence the members of this Lodge as they realise what her name implies? Let us wish the Founders of this Lodge every success in their efforts. May the Lodge grow in increasing enthusiasm for their Masonic learning and practice and may they do all in their power to extend the influence of that true entente, a union of the forces of brotherly love, relief and truth."

At the conclusion of the Consecration W.Bro John R Walker, P.M. City of London Lodge No.901 was duly installed as the first Master by the Grand Secretary. He remarked that it was the proudest day of his life, having been the first Master of Jeanne d'Arc No.5 France and now the first Master of Jeanne d'Arc No.4168.

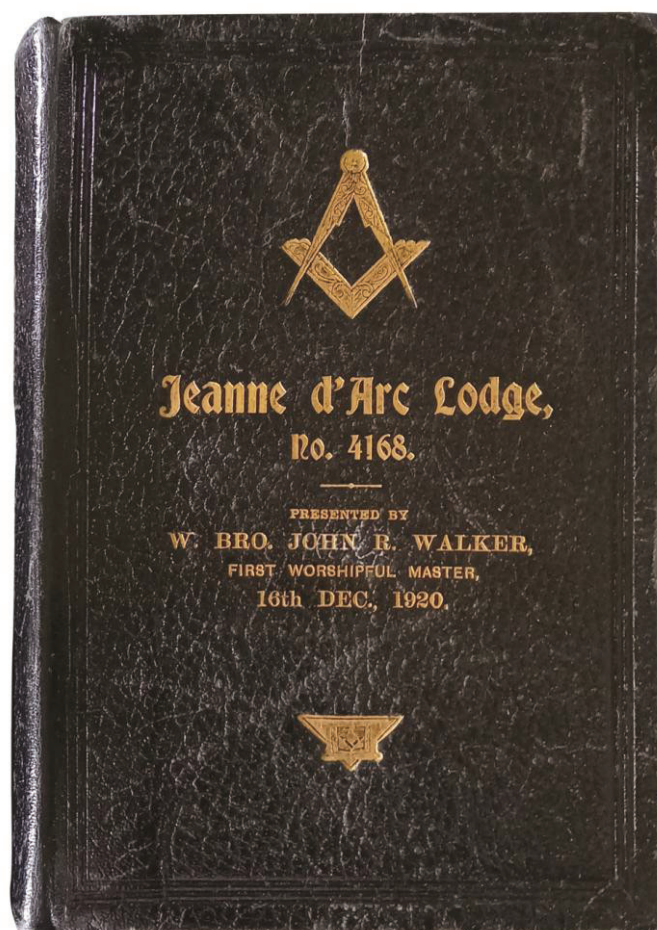

The First Year

The first Regular Meeting of the Lodge was held at 4.45pm on Wednesday 26th January 1921 at the Cecil Hotel, Strand, the Lodge By-Laws were established and the following fees were approved:-

Joining Fee	£7/7/0
Subscriptions	£4/4/0
Country Membership	£2/2/0
Visitors Dining Fee	15/-
Visitors at Installation	£1/1/0

The ballot was taken for the twenty three brethren who were proposed as joining members at the Consecration Meeting which proved in their favour. The ballot was also taken for the six candidates, which again proved in their favour and Mr Claude Gilbert Wilkins and Mr Alfred Joseph Pendry were duly initiated by the Worshipful Master. A further five candidates were proposed along with one other joining member.

It had been decided to hold six regular meetings per year and the dates were set for the fourth Wednesdays of January (Installation), February, March, September, October and November. That being said during the first year, fourteen meetings were held, at which some twenty six candidates were Initiated, eighteen brethren Passed to the Second Degree and thirteen Raised to the sublime Degree of a Master Mason.

Indeed an Emergency Meeting was immediately called on 17th February 1921 to initiate two candidates and to submit the Lodge By-Laws for approval.

At the meeting held on 23rd March 1921 it was proposed that the Jeanne d'Arc Lodge should endeavour to become a Hall Stone Lodge of the Masonic Memorial Building Fund. This proposition was carried unanimously. It was also proposed that the Lodge becomes a Founding Lodge of the Masonic Hospital and Nursing Home at a cost of £100.00 spread over five years. This too was carried unanimously.

An extremely busy Emergency Meeting took place on 28th April 1921 when two candidates were Initiated, two brethren Passed and a further two brethren Raised. The meeting started at 4.30pm and supper was served at 7.30pm. In fact the same business agenda took place at the next three meetings.

On 26th October 1921 the Worshipful Master presented W.Bro H V Hunt with a Past Masters Jewel at the request of the Worshipful Master of No.5 France for his year of service as their Master.

A special committee meeting of the Officers of the Lodge was held at the Cannon Public House, Cannon Street on 7th November 1921 where the following items were discussed:-

The formation of a Lodge of Instruction

The formation of a Charity Association

And that member's subscription to the Masonic Memorial Building Fund be paid half yearly.

A further committee meeting was held at the Devonshire Arms Public House and Hotel, Denman Street on 18th November to discuss the finer points of forming the Lodge of Instruction. A Ladies Festival had been held at the Cecil Hotel with tickets costing One Guinea. This had proven to be a successful night but due to an error by the Hotel staff, had ended with a deficit of £1/14/11. It was agreed this deficit would be paid out of the Lodge fund. The final meeting of the year was another Emergency Meeting held on 11th January 1922. On the agenda was one Raising, one Passing and two Initiations.

The Early Years

The second year of the Lodge took on a much slower pace with only seven meetings being held compared to fourteen in the previous year. Bro R C B Fisher was Installed as the second Master on 25th January 1922.

During the meeting held on the 28th February 1922 the brethren who had been initiated in the first year, presented W.Bro J R Walker with a handsome Rose Bowl, engraved with their names as a mark of appreciation for what he had done for them during his year as Master and for the kindness shown to them.

An Emergency Meeting was called on 26th April 1922 for which the Lodge had asked for a special Dispensation so they could Raise four brethren. The Dispensation was granted on the condition that the degree shall not be conferred on more than two candidates at any one time and the whole of the ceremony be performed on each occasion. A further Dispensation was granted under the same conditions allowing the lodge to also Pass four brethren. Abiding by the conditions of the Dispensation Bro's Harrison and Norton were Raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason followed by Bro's Sparrow and Mason. After which Bro's Bash and Fleet were Passed to the Second degree followed by Bro's Smallwood and Myers. The ceremonies of Raising were performed by the I.P.M., W.Bro J R Walker and the ceremonies of Passing by the Worshipful Master W.Bro R B Fisher.

A General Purpose Committee meeting was held at the Cannon Public House, Cannon Street on 13th September at which the Ladies Festival was discussed. It was agreed the Festival would take the form of a Dinner followed by a Musical Concert. Ticket prices were agreed at £1/1/0 per head with a start time of 6.00pm for 6.30pm. The choice of Ladies presents was to be left to the Worshipful Master.

The sad death of Bro W H Maunder was announced at the September meeting. He had been a Founder of the Lodge; it's first Director of Ceremonies and was the current Junior Warden. The Worshipful Master desired that Masonic mourning (three crepe rosettes on the badges of the apron) be worn at this meeting. The death of another Founder W.Bro H R Sinclair was announced at the following meeting.

A Ladies Festival had taken place at the Cecil Hotel on 8th November making a surplus of £9/16/3d. This money was later added to the Charity Box.

During the year, ten candidates had been Initiated, fourteen brethren Passed to the Second Degree and fourteen Raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason.

Throughout the remainder of the 1920's the Lodge continued to move forward and a further fifty six candidates were Initiated.

In 1923 the Initiation Fee was increased to 25 Guineas and the expenses for the Musical Programme at the Lodge banquets were to be paid from Lodge funds and not the Masters own pocket. Although this was capped to a maximum of £20 per year.

Having started the meetings at the Cecil Hotel in Fleet Street, a petition was put forward by members of the Lodge to move to the new Temple built at the Comedy Restaurants, Coventry Rooms, in Paton Street. The first meeting here was on 24th September 1924. Three meetings were held here with the fifth Installation meeting of January 1925 being held at Restaurant Frascati in Oxford Street. A further three meetings were held at the Comedy Restaurant before a further petition by thirty eight members saw the meetings move back to the Cecil Hotel in 1926. With the meeting day being changed to Fridays.

It was agreed to drop the January meeting from 1927 and to move the Installation to February, also to add a new meeting date in April. The meetings days reverted back to Wednesdays, but this time to the second Wednesday of the month.

The Lodge of Instruction having started at the Devonshire Arms, moved to the Lakes Restaurant, Tower Hill in 1925 and then again to The Mitre Hotel, Duke Street Hill, London Bridge in 1927.

Ladies Festivals were held each year many of which made a small loss, with the deficit being paid from Lodge funds. 184 tickets were sold for the 1924 festival held at the Restaurant Frascati, Oxford Street and a record 305 tickets were sold for the 1925 event at the Cecil Hotel, Fleet Street.

As well as making payments to the Masonic Memorial Building Fund and the Masonic Hospital and Nursing Home. The first payment to the Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution was made in 1922. The first payment to the Royal Masonic Institute for Boys was made in 1923 and the first payment to the Royal Masonic Institute for Girls in 1924.

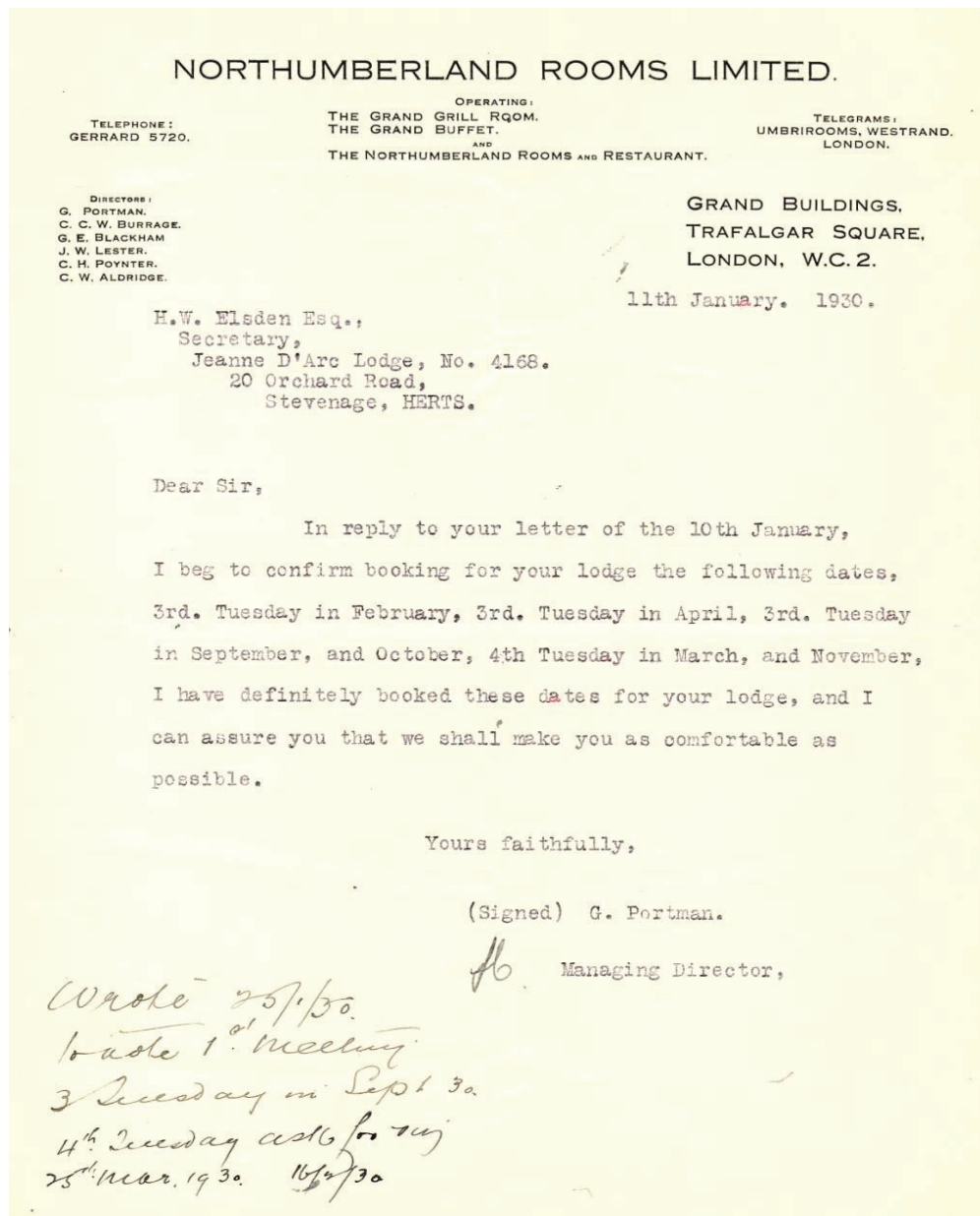
On the 4th January 1926 the Lodge received its certificate confirming it had become a Founding Lodge of the Freemasons Hospital and Nursing Home at 273, Fulham Road, London and on 12th October 1927 the Hall Stone Jewel from the Masonic Memorial Building Fund was presented to the Worshipful Master.

Back in 1923 it had been suggested that a Royal Arch Chapter should be linked to the Lodge and the Jeanne D'arc Chapter No.4168 was consecrated at Freemasons Hall on 25th January 1925. The majority of founders were members of the Lodge and W.Bro J R Walker became the inaugural First Principle. The Chapter stopped meeting in November 2004 and was finally moved from the list of active Chapters on 28th April 2005.

November 1928 saw the first Christmas gifts of 4 Guineas sent to the Lodge widows. During these first ten years the Lodge had lost several members to The Grand Lodge Above and seen many members resign for various reasons, but still had nearly 100 on its books.

The Installation of W.Bro Harry Serjeant Ingle on 12th February 1930 was the last meeting to take place at the Cecil Hotel. During the autumn of 1930 the building was largely demolished. The Strand Facade is all that remains of the original building.

Enquiries were made as to the availability of the Northumberland Rooms, Grand Buildings, Trafalgar Square and the first meeting was held here on 25th March. A special committee meeting was held prior to the main meeting, to decide if the facilities and dates on offer would be suitable as a permanent meeting venue. The dates offered were the third Tuesdays of February, April, September and October and the fourth Tuesdays of March and November. The decision was taken to move the Lodge to this new venue and apply for dispensation to change the meeting dates. This was later proposed at the regular meeting and passed by a majority of the brethren.



Much talk had taken place about starting a benevolent fund for the relief of members, widows and their children. This came into place at the meeting held on 19th April 1932.



A list of Past Masters appeared on the summons for the first time in March 1934 and in April W. Bro J R Walker was appointed Past Assistant Grand Standard Bearer. A Notice of Motion was put forward at the April meeting to pay half the cost for his Grand Lodge Clothing. With the other half coming from his Mother Lodge, City of London No.901. This was duly passed and the sum of £19/0/9d was taken from the Lodge funds.

A committee was formed in April 1934 to look for possible new accommodation. The following is taken from their report.

"Close comparisons were drawn between our present address and facilities at the Princes Galleries, Burlington Gardens and the Rembrandt, Slone Square. A visit was paid to the Piccadilly Hotel who had two Temples, good anti rooms each containing cubicles for the preparation of candidates. On the whole the accommodation and surroundings are more sumptuous than our present quarters and the food and wine are considered to be well up to standard. The Temples are a distinct improvement on our present ones but the cost is higher and members must be prepared to pay an increase in subscriptions by a least half a guinea or forego one meeting a year. One drawback is being two floors underground at times the rumble of Underground trains can be heard"

A proposal to move was put to the Lodge but defeated twenty for and thirty four against.

In November nine members of the lodge signed a petition asking for a Special General Meeting to be held, to consider the following *"That the Lodge be removed to Freemason Hall or some other suitable meeting place and meeting days be moved to the fourth Wednesdays of February, March, April, September, October and November"*. A meeting was summoned for 13th December for this purpose but the proposal was lost when the ballot returned two for and thirty nine against.

In March of 1935 the meeting dates were changed yet again. This time to the fourth Tuesday's of February, March, April, September, October and November. The changes to the By-Laws were approved by Grand Lodge in the June.

In consequence of the most lamented deaths of the RIGHT HONOURABLE THE LORD AMPHILL, G.C.S.I., G.C.I.E., MOST WORSHIPFUL PRO GRAND MASTER, and THE RIGHT HONOURABLE LORD CORNWALLIS, C.B.E., RIGHT WORSHIPFUL DEPUTY GRAND MASTER, events which have occasioned the profoundest sorrow to every Member of the Craft, by whom they were so greatly beloved, it is ordered that the Grand Lodge and all subordinate Lodges be placed in Masonic Mourning for the space of six months.

The mourning to be worn by Brethren to be as follows:— Three Rosettes of Black Crepe on the Badges, and one at the point of the Chain or Collar, just above the Jewel.

The Above notice appeared on the summons for October 1935. After the death of His Gracious Majesty King George V on 20th January 1936 the notice was amended as shown below.

In consequence of the death of HIS LATE MOST GRACIOUS MAJESTY KING GEORGE V, an event which has occasioned the most profound grief to every Member of the Craft, Masonic Mourning is ordered by Grand Lodge to be worn for the space of three months from the 21st January, 1936.

In consequence of the most lamented deaths of the RIGHT HONOURABLE THE LORD AMPHILL, G.C.S.I., G.C.I.E., MOST WORSHIPFUL PRO GRAND MASTER, and THE RIGHT HONOURABLE LORD CORNWALLIS, C.B.E., RIGHT WORSHIPFUL DEPUTY GRAND MASTER, Mourning will be worn for the space of six months.

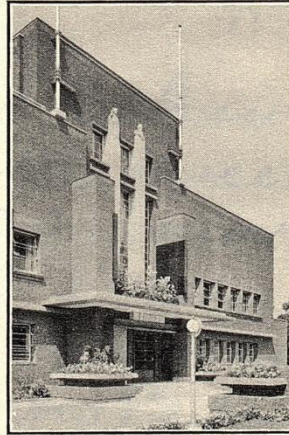
Three Rosettes of Black Crepe on the Badges, and one at the point of the Chain or Collar, just above the Jewel.

The Auditors that year appealed to the members to pay their subscriptions on time as £90/6/0 was still outstanding. There had also been significant outstanding subscriptions the year before. His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, K.G., etc, retired from the office of Most Worshipful Grand Master, which he had held for thirty eight years from 1901 to 1939. He died on 16th January 1942. His Highness the Duke of Kent was elected to succeed him and at an Especial Meeting of Grand Lodge at Olympia on 19th July 1939, he was duly installed as Most Worshipful Grand Master by His Majesty George IV, Past Grand Master. The Lodge was represented by W.Bro J Walker, W.Bro H Elsdon, W.Bro G Bray, W.Bro S Mendoza and W.Bro C Roberts. The reign of His Highness as Grand Master was unfortunately only too short as he was killed on Active Service in August 1942.

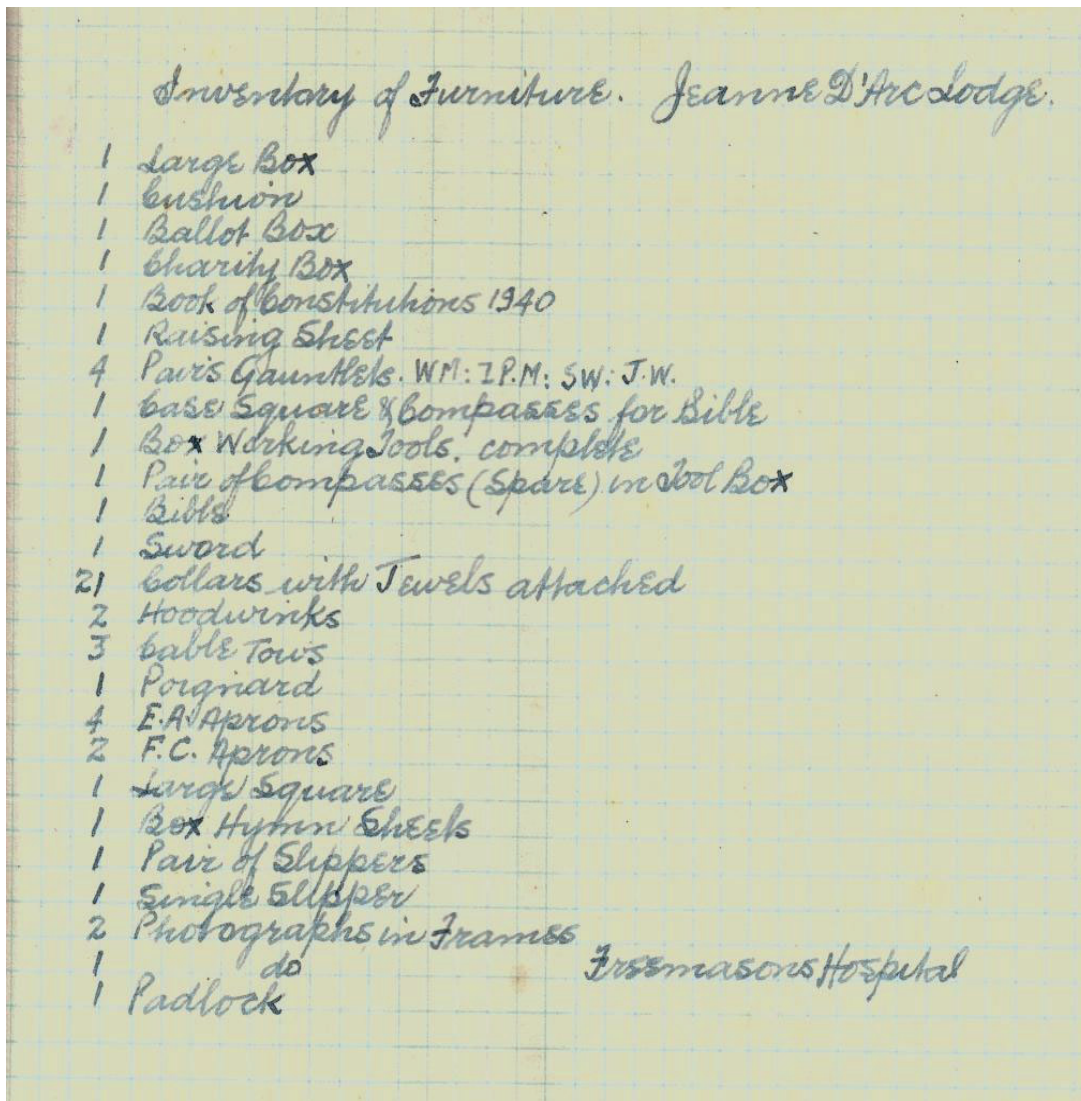

The Second World War

The outbreak of war in September 1939 had a severe effect of Freemasonry. Indeed a few days after hostilities broke out Grand Lodge issued instructions suspending the activities of all Masonic Lodges. This only lasted for a short period and the only meeting cancelled was the September one. The dates and times of meetings were changed to obtain the greatest advantage of daylight hours and to avoid travelling in the Black Out. Festive Boards were cancelled due to food rationing, but at times light refreshments were supplied.

Once again the Lodge found itself looking for new accommodation, as in early 1941 the building containing the Northumberland Rooms was requisitioned for Government use. They found their new home at Freemasons Hall, Great Queen Street, where it has remained ever since. The move to Freemasons Hall necessitated a change to the meeting dates which became the third Tuesdays in April, May, June and September.

There were no candidates for Initiation during 1941 and the brethren made use of this to perform other, often unseen pieces of ritual. Item four on the Summons for June that year was:-

- Charge after Initiation by the Worshipful Master
- Explanation of the First Tracing Board by W.Bro G Bray
- Charge after Passing by Bro B Trenner
- Charge after Raising by Bro L Bash
- Third Address from Installation by the Worshipful Master

The Twenty First Anniversary of the Lodge took place by special dispensation at Freemasons Hall on 16th December 1941. The meeting commenced at 11.30am with Lunch in the Connaught Rooms at 1.00pm. No special ceremony marked the occasion apart from a proposition that the Master and Brethren be congratulated on the progress the Lodge had made during its twenty one years. It had gone from strength to strength and it was thought that it was a fitting time to record these facts in the minutes. No other work took place other than the election of Officers.

During the first two years of the war no Ladies Festivals were held but in 1941 W.Bro Herbert Miller the Worshipful Master held what he called an "Afternoon Party" for Ladies. This proved a great success and continued yearly throughout the war.

It is believed the following pictures of crockery bearing the Lodge crest, were a gift from that party. The Lodge Name has been replaced with the word "Festival".





In February 1942 subscriptions were halved to £2/0/0d and it was decided to dine only at the Installation meetings until the end of the war. The business conducted at the meeting was an explanation of the Fifth and Sixth sections of the First Lecture and an explanation of the Third Degree Tracing Board.

A letter was received in March 1943 from the United Grand Lodge of England, asking if the Lodge would be prepared to Pass and Raise Bro S/Sgt Howard Burger of the Fostoria Lodge No.288 Fostoria, Ohio. A serving member of 8th Bomber Command. He was subsequently Passed on 27th April and Raised on 28th September.

Bro Howard Burger also attended the meeting in November 1943.

During 1944 the Lodge was attended several times by Bro Leroy C Bridgeman of the Trenton-Wyandotte Lodge No.8 Michigan, USA and once by Bro R W Ralich of Sojourners Lodge No.51 Washington DC.

In November 1944 it was proposed that the Resolution dated 23rd February 1943 regarding the reduction in subscriptions during the Hostilities be rescinded and that subscriptions revert to Four Guineas from the Installation Meeting, February 1945.

The United Grand Lodge of England passed a directive in December 1945 that all temporary meeting dates and times would end and Lodges are to return to normal as written in their By-Laws. Special dispensation would still be given where a return to normal premises was not permissible. It also stated that Lodges should meet in Morning Dress or Uniform. (An insistence on Evening Dress being worn may keep brethren from attending and deprive them of their privileges). White Gloves should not be worn.

Lodge of Instruction restarted in March 1945 at a new venue, the Kings Arms, John Street, Theobalds Road, Clerkenwell, WC1 on Wednesday evenings at 7.00pm.

Throughout the duration of the war and immediately afterwards it was difficult to obtain Past Masters Jewels and five Masters had to wait until 1950 to be presented with theirs.

Although times were difficult, attendance at Lodge meetings remained fairly consistent between September 1939 and September 1945 with an average of forty six brethren per meeting. The highest being the Installation meeting of February 1945 with ninety five attending and the lowest of twenty seven at the October 1942 meeting.

There is no mention in the Minute Books of any brother being wounded or killed in action during the War.

DARK MORNING DRESS or UNIFORM

The Twenty Fifth Anniversary meeting was held by special Dispensation at Freemasons Hall on 17th December 1945 to be as close to the Consecration date as was possible. Sixty six members of the Lodge were present along with seventy six guests. The Minutes from the Consecration Meeting were read by Bro Secretary and afterwards three founders gave the three addresses as at Installation. W.Bro H Elsden gave the address to the Worshipful Master, W.Bro Capt. G T Bray to the Wardens and W.Bro S Mendoza to the Brethren. W.Bro F W Shaw assisted by the Worshipful Master gave a beautiful rendering of the Second Section of the 2nd Lecture "The Creation". After which the Banquet was held at the Connaught Rooms. There were ninety one members and one honorary member of the lodge in 1945.

A History of the first twenty five years of the Lodge was written by W.Bro's George Bray and Herbert Elsden.

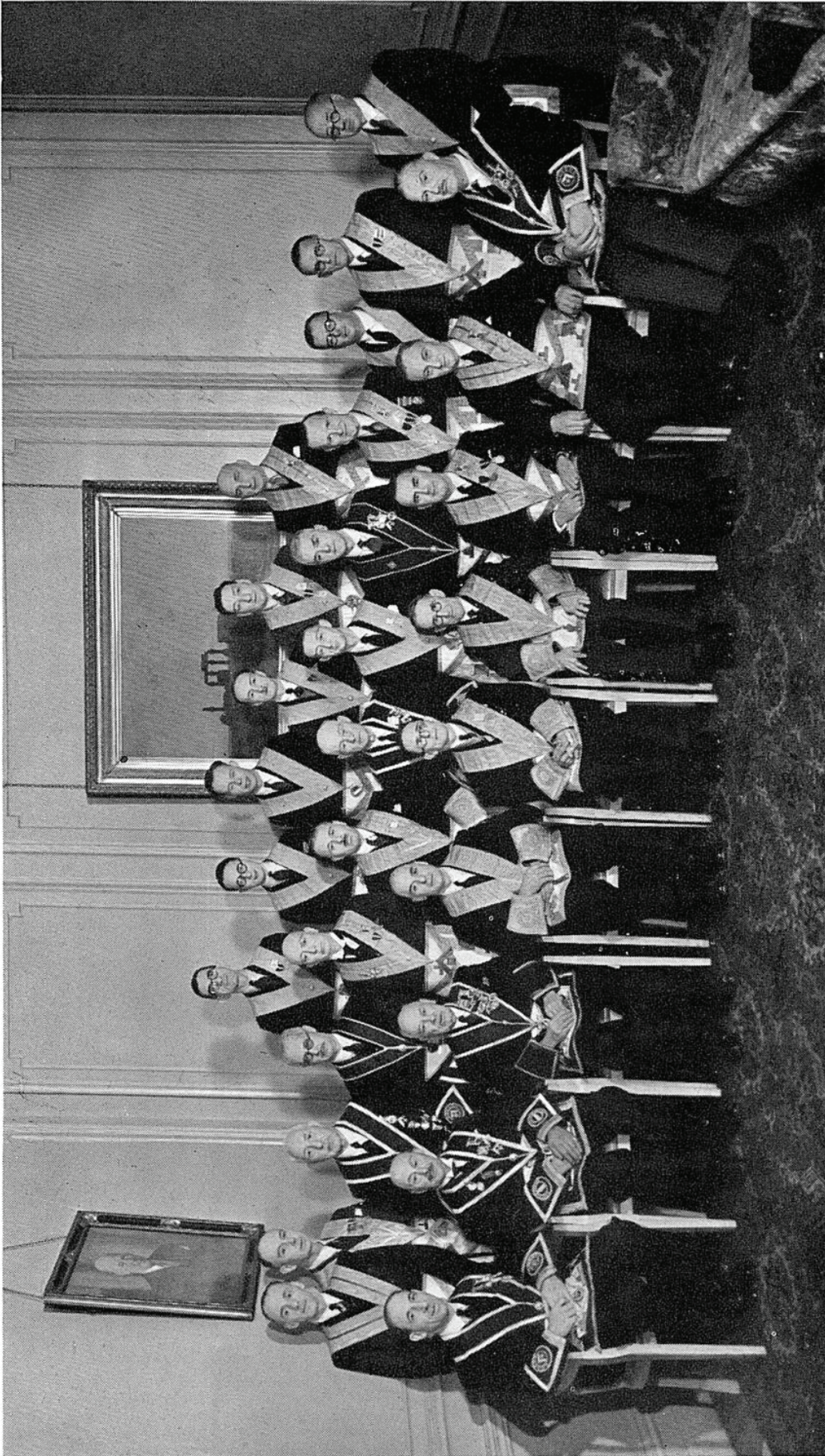

1947 Onwards

The first Lodge to be sponsored by Jeanne d'Arc was the Fleur de Lys No.6479, consecrated at Freemasons Hall on 21st July 1947. Of the seventeen Founders, eleven were members of Jeanne d'Arc. The Worshipful Master designate was W.Bro S Mendoza a member of No.5 France and founder of Jeanne d'Arc. The Senior Warden Bro F H Worsley and Junior Warden Bro R F Randell were both initiates of 4168 along with the Secretary W.Bro H W Elsdon another member of No.5 France and Founder and current Secretary of Jeanne d'Arc. Sadly the Lodge was erased on 11th June 2008 in order to amalgamate with the Lodge of United Hearts No.6590 and Portsoken Lodge No.5088 the latter keeping its name and number.

Subscriptions were increased by 10/6d in 1949 to 4½ Guineas. The Initiation Fee went up 2½ Guineas to 22½ Guineas and Visitors dining was increased by 6/ to 1 Guinea. The Joining Fee became 10 Guineas.

A proposal was put forward by W.Bro G A Pottle that the Lodge sponsor a Church Service, to be held at Kentish Town Parish Church on 12th June 1949. This was agreed by the members and special dispensation was granted by Grand Lodge to allow the wearing of Masonic Regalia. The retiring collection raised £100/6/10. After deducting the cost of the dispensation, 40 Guineas was donated to the Church Organ Fund and 40 Guineas to the Royal Masonic Benevolent Intuition. This went on to become an annual event.

Payments had been made over the years to various Masonic Charities and in February 1950 Bro Treasurer, W.Bro G T Bray gave an update to the brethren and was please to announce the following had been paid to each charity by the Lodge and Individual Members.

He congratulated the brethren and thanked them for their generous donations.

At the November meeting in 1950 the following Brethren were finally able to receive their Past Master's Jewels. W.Bro H W Miller, W.Bro J A Ball, W.Bro A Pannaman, W.Bro S S Smith and W.Bro W Edwards.

The Worshipful Master W.Bro G Pye, announced during the October meeting of 1951 that in future all potential initiates were to be visited in their homes by members of the committee before being invited to attend an interview.

By this time the Lodge was of considerable size, regularly seeing over sixty members at each meeting. It was therefore proposed to sponsor a second Lodge. To be known as the Lodge of Lorraine No.7176. It was consecrated on the 6th May 1952 at Freemasons Hall with our own W.Bro S Mendoza being one of the Consecrating Officers. Of the fourteen Founders nine had been initiated into Jeanne d'Arc. W.Bro A Pannaman was the Worshipful Master designate and W.Bro H W Elsdon became the first Secretary. This Lodge still meets today at the Southgate Masonic Centre.

By 1953 there were grave concerns over the financial future of the Lodge and the following letter was sent out with the October summons.

JEANNE D'ARC LODGE No. 4168.

October 1953

TO THE MEMBERS.

Your Committee are gravely concerned regarding the Lodge finances. For some years past, the Lodge has not been self-supporting and inroads have had to be made into the accumulated reserves in order to meet recurring deficits. Despite increased austerity, the Lodge continues to run at a loss and the Treasurer has only been able to meet accounts by pressing the collection of arrears and seeking the co-operation of the Brethren to pay subscriptions immediately they fall due.

Your Committee are also concerned with the position of the Benevolent Fund. The By-laws of the Lodge authorise the appropriation of 10% of the Members annual subscription to this Fund should it fall below £400. For some years past it has been considerably below that figure—it is at present £369 13s. 11d.—but the Treasurer has not been able to make the allocation and has had to apply the total income to running expenses.

When the Lodge was formed in 1920, fees were as follows:

Initiation	15 guineas.
Joining	5 guineas.
Subscription	4 guineas p.a.
Guests	15s.

In 1930, the initiation fee was raised to 20 guineas and the joining fee to 10 guineas.

In 1950, the initiation fee was further increased to 22½ guineas, subscription to 4½ guineas and guest fees to 1 guinea. Joining fees were unaltered.

In 1920 we paid 8s. 6d. for dinner; the per capita expense at each meeting was 11s. 6d., inclusive of wines and cigars.

Today we pay 14s. for an austerity dinner and the per capita expense at each meeting is 21s. 10d., inclusive of beer and cigarettes only. The fixed overheads appertaining to running the Lodge increase this figure by 2s. 6d. per meeting. Guests are self-supporting.

The Treasurer has pointed out that it will not be possible to pay for the remaining meetings of the current year without further inroads into the Lodge reserves. Our present bank balance is inadequate for our current needs.

The following possibilities have been considered:

1. Increasing the number of initiates;
2. Increased austerity;
3. A reduction in the number of meetings.

- Re (1) It is felt that consequent on the extensive growth of membership and the resulting loss of the sense of intimate friendship which previously existed and which the subsequent expansion of membership has impaired, this course is to be deprecated and, in fact, avoided. Membership should be restricted for some years to come; even when due allowance is made for natural wastage arising from death and other causes, it will still take a considerable time to restore our numbers to such reasonable proportions as will enable the members freely to mix and become better and closer acquainted than at present.
- Re (2) The austerity now practised is such that any further reduction in amenities could only result in resignations.
- Re (3) Whilst anxious not to lessen the facilities the Brethren have for meeting each other, the Committee feel that it is not within the purse of the majority of members to continue to meet on the desired scale as frequently as hitherto, i.e., six times a year.

The Committee feel that drastic revisions should be made, such revisions to be adequate to restore our finances and permit us to enjoy the social side of our meetings with *reasonable* comfort and without fear of a further revision in the foreseeable future.

Your Committee recommend as follows :

Fees.—Initiation to be increased to 30 guineas.
 Joining to be increased to 15 guineas.
 Subscription to be increased to 6 guineas.
 Guest fees : Installation, 30s.; Ordinary Meetings, 25s.
 Country Members : No change.

Meetings.—To be reduced from six to five a year.

Initiates.—Limited to two a year until the overall membership of the Lodge is reduced by death and other causes to below 100.

General.—Normally, meetings should not commence before 5 o'clock and should be limited to one Degree only.
 Tipping at table should be discontinued.

The above recommendations to take effect in February, 1954.

If these recommendations are approved, your Committee feel that the Benevolent Fund should be increased to the proper level at the earliest possible date; further, that the amenities of the Lodge be improved as under :

- (1) An additional 6s. per head be allocated for expenditure at ordinary meetings. This would allow a better menu, render wine available instead of beer only, and obviate the undesirable habit of waiters collecting tips at the table;
- (2) The above to be increased to 10s. per head at the Installation Meetings. This would allow a still better menu, include wine and cigars, and thus enable the Lodge to celebrate in a manner befitting the occasion.
- (3) The restriction of Initiates to two a year will permit the W.M. to perform all his work adequately and enable from time to time Sections of the Lectures and the like to be given, thus rendering our Ceremonies most attractive and interesting to members and their guests alike.

The Committee feel that if these recommendations are approved and implemented, we may confidently expect our Lodge to regain its former prestige in a very short time and that members will once more be pleased to invite their Masonic friends to visit them.

Several proposed amendments were made but they were all rejected. The most noticeable outcome from this was to discontinue the September meeting.

September Meetings are discontinued.

W.Bro C Roberts informed the brethren he had arranged a visit of inspection to the Royal Masonic Hospital on Saturday 6th February and urged as many of the members as possible to attend.

The March meeting of 1956 was moved by dispensation to 5th April, due to the original date clashing with the Feast of Passover and the fact that we now had many members of the Jewish faith in the Lodge. As the Connaught Room were not available for the Festive Board alternative arrangements were made at the Hanway Suite.

The Worshipful Master wishes the Brethren to note that the March Meeting has been postponed to Thursday, 5th April, 1956.

Dinner has been arranged for 7 p.m., in the Hanway Suite, Oxford Corner House (entrance Tottenham Court Rd.) where there is accommodation for hats and coats.

Officers are requested to leave Collars with the Tyler before leaving Freemasons Hall.

By 1956 the Jeanne d'Arc Lodge had become a Founding Lodge and Patron of the Royal Masonic Hospital, Vice Patron of the Royal Masonic Institute for Boys, Vice Patron of the Royal Masonic Institute for Girls and Vice Patron of the Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution.

Bro R Mountray-Reed presented a Sword to the lodge on 25th March 1958 for the use of the Tyler. This generous gift was welcomed by the Worshipful Master who asked for a vote of thanks to be recorded in the minutes. This sword is still used today.

As the Lodge moved into the 60's average numbers attending meetings fell below fifty for the first time and by 1965 this had fallen to the mid thirties.

The following directive was received from Grand Lodge in October 1964.

LONDON LODGES.

The practice of permitting junior Brothers of the Lodge to take part in that part of the Ritual marked for the Master is to be deprecated and should not be permitted. This applies to the explanation of the Working Tools, the Charge after Initiation, the First and Second Tracing Boards which should never be rendered by a member below the rank of a Warden, while the Traditional History can be appropriately delivered only by the Installed Master.

Whilst the junior Brother may be capable of rendering any of these lectures it must be borne in mind that it is for the Master to preside over his Lodge, the junior officers having each certain well defined duties to discharge. It is surely quite inappropriate for the Work to be done by the members whose rank does not qualify them even to discharge these minor duties.

In 1965 W.Bro T Lander who was a joining member at our first meeting, proposed "That the Lodge adopts the permissive variations in the obligation of the Third Degree, as approved by Grand Lodge on 9th December 1964". Lodges were given a five year period in which to make a trial of the changes. W.Bro B Miller supported by several other Past Masters preferred the obligation to remain unchanged and asked that we wait the five years. A ballot was taken on W.Bro Landers original proposition which resulted ten for the proposition and twenty against.

Pursuant to a Notice of Motion given on 25th November 1966 W.Bro Treasurer proposed "That the Lodge contribute an amount equivalent in pounds of the total subscribing membership of the Lodge to the "250th Anniversary Fund", As there were ninety four subscribing members a payment of £94.00 was made to the Fund. The 250th Jewel was worn by the Worshipful Master for the first time in February 1967.

Tragedy struck the Lodge during the Ladies Festival on 28th January 1967, being held at the Rembrandt Hotel. The Worshipful Master W.Bro Simon Wilsack and his wife Esther, were receiving their guests when Esther collapsed. She was taken to hospital but was pronounced dead on arrival. On hearing of the sad news after the banquet, W.Bro Squires who had taken the Presidents place decided to terminate the proceedings immediately.

At the Installation meeting the following month and out of respect to Mrs Wilsack and sympathy to the Worshipful Master, W.Bro Squires gave an appreciation of the outstanding, charming and willing service the Lady President had given to all. She was greatly esteemed for the many public services she had carried out and was an outstanding Teacher and Headmistress of a Jewish day school, whose guiding light was the Volume of the Sacred Law. As a token off esteem the brethren stood in silence while the organist played the hymn Adon Olam from the Hebrew Liturgy. The Chaplain recited the English translation of the last verse:

**"Into his hands I commend my spirit
When I sleep and when I wake
And with my spirit my body also
The Lord is with me and I will not fear"**

Dispensation was granted by Grand Lodge in 1967 to allow the Lodge to move the April meeting to May. It was agreed something had to be done to try and encourage more members to attend the meetings. There were some ninety two subscribing members of the Lodge but only around thirty were attending meetings on a regular basis.

Fees that year were increased. Annual Subscriptions went up to £9/10/0 with Country Membership increasing to £3/10/0, The Initiation fee became £40.00 and the Joining Member fee £20.00.

The Lodge of Instruction which was still well represented moved to "The Enterprise" 2 Haverstock Hill NW3 which was owned by Bro Charles Lyon.

Due to ill health the Worshipful Master was unable to attend the November meeting in 1969 and sent the following Telegram to the Secretary on the day of the meeting.

The 50th Anniversary meeting was moved by Dispensation to 16th December 1970 to coincide with the day of its Consecration. The Lodge was Opened by the Worshipful Master, W.Bro R Williamson who immediately invited W.Bro Thomas Lander, a Joining Member from the Consecration Meeting and now 81 years of age to take the Chair. He in turn invited W.Bro H Miller Initiated in 1922 to occupy the Office of Senior Warden and W.Bro H Clark Initiated 1930 the Junior Wardens Office. The Minutes of the Consecration Meeting were read and the brethren were treated to a very interesting and informative lecture on the History of the Four Masonic Charities by W.Bro H Miller. This was followed by an explanation of the 1st Degree Tracing Board by the Lodge Chaplain W.Bro A Row.

W.Bro S Wilsack presented a new Bible Cushion in his wife's memory. In addition to the Name and Number of the Lodge it also contained her name and has the inscription "Her guiding Light was the Volume of the Sacred Law".



At the time there were ninety two subscribing members, forty five of whom attended, along with fifty two visitors, eleven being members of No.5 France. A short history of the Lodge was written by W.Bro T Lander who had researched the Lodge books, but mainly called on his own memories. After the meeting the brethren dined on the Menu below with their guests at the Connaught Rooms.

The 70's to the 90's

After less than four months at the "Roebuck" the Lodge of Instruction moved for the third time in four years to the "Sugar Loaf" 40 Great Queen Street meeting on a Monday evening. Subscriptions were increased to £12.00 and Dining went up to £2.75.

By 1972 although there were ninety four subscribing members, still less than half were attending the meetings and in an attempt to increase attendance and limit the increase of subscriptions a Notice of Motion was proposed to reduce the number of meeting per year to four and discontinue with the April meeting. Subscriptions increased to £15.00, dining had to be increased by 75p to £3.50 and the Initiation fee was raised to £50.00.

W.Bro T Lander one of our original joining members from No.5 France had become increasingly concerned about the quality of ritual being carried out and it is recorded in the minutes of November 1972 that he strongly criticised the work carried out in Lodge. Especially the slack way the Wardens performed in the 3rd Degree and expressed very strongly that brethren must attend Lodge of Instruction to stop the deterioration of the Lodge.

The Lodge received the status of Grand Vice Patron of the Royal Masonic Hospital in 1973 and also that year pursuant to a Notice of Motion and with the approval of Grand Lodge the April meeting was permanently dropped.

That year saw yet another increase of £1.00 to the dining fee, bringing this to £4.50 and a 33.33% increase to the annual subscriptions taking them to £20.00.

Dispensation was sought from Grand Lodge to move the March meeting to 8th April. This meeting was to be the first of a series of joint meetings attended by members of the other three associated Lodges. The City of London Lodge No.901, Fler de Lys No.6479 and Lodge of Lorraine No.7176. This was to be repeated in turn every four years by each Lodge.

Although this meeting was only attended by thirty four Jeanne d'Arc members there were one hundred and four visitors present. After the meeting all one hundred and thirty eight brethren returned to the Lodge Room to witness a demonstration of an old French Workings of the 1st Degree (in English) by members of Duquesne Lodge No.48 GLNF Dieppe. The charity box circulated after this demonstration realised £100.00 which was given to the Duquesne Lodge. They in turn donated £50.00 to French Masonic Charities, £25.00 to the Royal Masonic Hospital and gave £25.00 to the Masters List, which was also donated to the Masonic Hospital.

The Grand Masters committee asked that steps be taken for lodges to implement the Bagnall Report of 1974 and to appoint a Charity Steward. W.Bro P Freeman became the first member of Jeanne d'Arc appointed to that Office in February 1976.

Lodge membership had now dropped to eighty one.

1976 saw the Treasurer W.Bro H Miller celebrate 50 years in Masonry as a member of Jeanne d'Arc. It was asked that recognition and approval of his 50 years service to

the Lodge be recorded in the minutes. W.Bro Miller thanked the brethren for their kind words and replied that *"He had been and always would be, happy to serve the Lodge to the limit of his ability"*.

Subscriptions this year had another 25% increase taking them to £25.00.

1977 started with yet another increase in subscriptions making them now £32.00 and dining was raised to £6.00. Later in the year there were once again grave concerns for the finances of the Lodge and a levy of £1.50 was imposed on all members, to cover the shortfall in dining. To again try and save money it was proposed that dining be transferred from the Connaught Rooms to the Europa Restaurant, Parker Street WC2, but unavoidably subscriptions still had to be raised to £40.00.

Lodge of Instruction changed venues again, this time to "The Old Ivy House" Public House at 166 Goswell Road, EC1 and moved to a Tuesday evening starting at 7.00pm.

Dining at the Europa Restaurant did not prove favourable with the brethren and in March 1978 transferred to the Del Re Restaurant in the Kingsway.

Bro P B Morris who became Master Elect in November 1978 wrote to Bro Secretary stating that due to a sudden and unexpected transfer by his employers to a post abroad for a period of three years, he would be unable to fulfil his duties as Master for 1979. He expressed his great disappointment at not being able to become Master and hoped that after his three year absence he would be welcomed back into the Lodge and would one day be able to become Master. (Bro Morris never did become Master)

By dispensation an emergency meeting was called on 30th January 1979 and W.Bro W R Davies the current Senior Warden and a Past Master of the Lodge of Lorraine was elected Master for the ensuing year.

The Del Re Restaurant proved even less favourable with the brethren and after one Festive Board moved to Bunters Restaurant further along the Kingsway.

A busy meeting in October 1979 saw Bro M Cowan Raised, Bro M Cooper Passed and a comprehensive talk given by W.Bro Hans Premn of Vereingten Framp Au Elb Ovabe No.368 West Germany on the work of his Constitution.

A list was produced in 1980 showing the Lodge had sixty seven subscribing members, but at the Installation meeting that year only twenty six members attended to see W.Bro W A J Beer Installed as Master for the second time, becoming Master for the 60th Anniversary of the Lodge. He had first taken the Chair in 1959 and became the first Master to occupy the Chair twice.

A proposal that annual subscriptions be increased to £52.00 and the Initiation fee to £75.00 from 1st January 1981 was passed by the brethren. It was also agreed to increase the amount of the Christmas gift to the Widows from £5.00 to £10.00.

Dining continued to take place at the same restaurant which had now changed its name to "Parkers".

W.Bro A Row gave a full explanation of the request from Grand Lodge that we adopt the alternative wording to the Traditional Penalties. After much discussion this was agreed unanimously.

After four years at the Old Ivy Public House, Lodge of Instruction moved to The Abbey Community Association 29, Marsham Street SW1, meeting on a Wednesday evening at 7.00pm.

Mr Andrew Frederick Bailey a Self Drive Car Hire Operator had been balloted for as a candidate for initiation. He was absent when the ballot was taken and therefore due to be initiated at the next meeting. He gave his apologies for that meeting and was never heard from again.

Bro Norman Stuart Roberts was Installed as Master in February 1982. However it was realised he had not served a full year as Warden and therefore retrospective dispensation under Rule 109 Book of Constitutions had to be applied for.

1983 saw subscriptions raised to £65.00 and the Initiation fee to £100.00. Country Membership was increased to £25.00 and dining for Country Members and visitors was increased to £10.00.

In 1984 the Lodge of Instruction moved again, this time to the Three Tuns Public House, Chancery Lane.

Concerns were raised by Bro Almoner in 1985 over the ability to cover the cost of the Widows Christmas gifts. The Almoners accounts for the year show income of £262.09 but expenditure of £297.53. An appeal was made to the brethren for further donations to get the account back in credit.

The Summonses from 1986 ask the brethren to obtain details of the venue for Lodge of Instruction from W.Bro G Plastow having now left the Three Tuns Public House.

Another candidate balloted for initiation, Mr Anthony Lovell-Smith gave his apologies as he was in hospital on the day he was due to be initiated. He failed to be in attendance the following meeting and his application was rescinded.

1987 began with a move back to the Connaught Rooms for the Festive Boards. Another increase in subscriptions was necessary taking them to £95.00. It was also agreed that from now on dining for Country Members and Visitors would be at cost.

Attendance at meetings during the 80's slowly decreased and October 1988 saw only eighteen present, although there were fifty one subscribing members on the books.

Once again the expenditure for the Widows Christmas gifts had exceeded the Almoner's income for the year by the sum of £47.00 this would have been £92.00 had three of the Widows not passed away during the year. There was still £262.00 in the account but Bro Almoner pleaded for more donations from the brethren so this money would not be eroded.

During 1987 the Senior Warden Bro M S Cowan did not attend the October or November meetings and asked to be placed on the Country Membership List. Subsequently he did not progress to the Masters Chair and the reigning Master W.Bro O J Trenner was re-elected for 1988, becoming to first Master to hold the Chair for two consecutive years.

For the first time since 1941 and for only the second time in the Lodges history, no Initiations took place in 1988.

In March 1989 W.Bro J Webb of the Quatuor Coronati Lodge No.2076 delivered a lecture entitled "Rudyard Kipling Poet and Mason". It was a most interesting and enthralling lecture which was very well received by the brethren who at the conclusion stood to show their appreciation. W.Bro Webb returned at the next meeting and this time gave a lecture entitled "The Poetry and Prose of Freemasonry", which was received with the same enthusiasm as on the previous occasion.

It was agreed in the November that £100.00 would be transferred from the Benevolent Account to the Almoners Account to assist in covering the cost of this year Christmas gifts to the Widows.

In a bid to reduce the cost of dining the following venues were arranged for 1990:

February	Parkers, 109 Kingsway, WC2
March	Charlies Restaurant, 151 Drury Lane, WC2
October	Charlies Restaurant, 151 Drury Lane, WC2
November	The Sugar Loaf, Great Queen Street, WC2

For February, March and November 1991 the Festive Boards were held at Parkers, 109 Kingsway with the October Festive Board being held at Charlie's Restaurant.

The election for Worshipful Master for 1992 was thrown into disarray when Bro David Gladstone the current Senior Warden indicated that due to professional and personal reasons he did not wish to become Master. After due consideration, the Lodge Committee recommended that W.Bro Malcolm Cooper continue as Master for a second year. This was agreed by all members and in compliance with the Book of Constitutions; his name was put forward for election. W.Bro Cooper thanked the brethren for allowing him the honour of serving as Master for another year and trusted he would prove worthy of their unanimous support.

A lack of ceremonies to perform in 1992 saw lectures on "The Origins of Freemasonry" and "Jewish Connections with Freemasonry" being delivered at meetings.

1994 saw a Notice of Motion presented to move the March meeting forward to April and the October meeting back to September. This was accepted by the brethren. It also saw subscriptions raised to £105.00.

In February 1995, the Lodge Minutes were typed instead of handwritten for the first time and during the meeting W.Bro Alan Ward PPJGW (Herts) presented to the Lodge a Tantalus he had been given by a Mr & Mrs Pippett, inscribed "*Presented to W.Bro W R Taylor by the brethren of Jeanne d'Arc Lodge of Instruction, in recognition of his great kindness whilst at the Devonshire Arms 1921, 22 & 23*" There is no mention of who Mr & Mrs Pippett were, how they obtained it, or why it had been given to W.Bro Ward. It is believed the Tantalus is now in the possession of W.Bro G Goldman, Master at the time it was returned.

Bro Secretary informed the Brethren that no Past Master wished to be put forward for election, neither did the Junior Warden. W.Bro G Goldman was therefore re-elected to stay for a second term, making him the first Brother to have held the Office of Master on three occasions. It was also proposed that a supplement of £10 per member be imposed to cover the cost of dining at the 75th Anniversary Meeting and subscriptions be increased to £115.00 from the Installation meeting of 1996.

The Lodge celebrated its 75th Anniversary at the Installation Meeting held on 27th February 1996 where the Minutes from the Consecration Meeting were read before W.Bro Geoffrey Goldman was Re-Installed as Master.

Sadly this meeting was only attended by eighteen members, outnumbered by the twenty six visitors in attendance that day. The brethren dined afterwards at the Bonnington Hotel, Southampton Row. This is now the DoubleTree by Hilton where we currently dine.

1996 Onwards

The Summons produced from September 1996 onwards had the Opening and Closing Hymns printed. 1997 saw W.Bro D Marsh re-elected as Worshipful Master, becoming the fourth Master to serve for two consecutive years. Subscriptions were increased by £20 taking them to £135.00 and the Initiation fee was increased to £143.00.

Like many London Lodges attendance dropped throughout most of the 90's with between only eighteen and twenty members attending each meeting.

The new Millennium continued to see a drop in attendance, a lack of candidates and a variety of lectures being delivered at meetings. Subscriptions rose rapidly first to £145.00, then £165.00 and by 2003 had reached £170.00. A Notice of Motion was passed in 2003 that the Lodge should consider becoming a Founder Lodge of the Metropolitan Grand Lodge of London. This was agreed and the appropriate fee was paid. Brethren were encouraged to become individual founders and to book their places at the inauguration to take place at the Royal Albert Hall on 1st October.

A fascinating demonstration was delivered at the September meeting by the Gainsborough Lodge Demonstration Team. That of the First Degree set aboard HMS Corinthian, a third rate Frigate bound for the siege of Quebec in 1795. It was received with much approbation by the brethren and the sixty six visitors who attended that day. A lack of members attending meetings led to W.Bro M Cooper having to take on the role of Almoner alongside that of Secretary.

Diane Clements the Director of the Library and Museum of Freemasonry attended the Lodge in September 2005 and gave a very informative talk on "The Treasure of the Library and Museum" which was very well received by the Brethren.

W.Bro Malcolm Cooper announced he had been in the Office of Secretary for over ten years and asked if anyone wished to take over the role. It was 2008 before he was able to relinquish the position.

An interesting lecture was given in September 2006 after the Lodge Closed by W.Bro D Peabody of the Quatuor Coronati Lodge No.2076 entitled "The Whitechapel Murders and Freemasonry". It was followed by a lively Question and Answer session.

By dispensation in 2006 the November meeting was moved from the fourth Thursday to the first Thursday of the month. This was due to the fact that the meeting clashed with that of the Mandate Chapter No.4258 to which many of the members now belonged. Bro Secretary stated it was his intention from now on to send the Summons and related paperwork to the members by E-Mail in PDF form. That meeting saw Bro John Vincent Francis Casey Raised on behalf of Lodge Malaya No.5213. It was also agreed that a Relief Chest with Grand Charity would be set up.

More Lectures followed over the next few years including the following:

"Masonic Poetry - its Philosophy and Humour"

"The Logistics of King Solomon's Temple"

"The Hall Stone Jewel"

"Solving the Masonic Conundrum of Mozart's Opera the Magic Flute"

"Freemasonry in the First World War"

2009 saw a visit from The Metropolitan Inspector W.Bro John Hussey, who presented W.Bro Maurice Hearn with his 50 Year Certificate. Special arrangements had been made to get W.Bro Hearn to the meeting. W.Bro John Reuther from the RMBI presented the Lodge with its Bronze Award at the November meeting. He then gave a talk on the work of the RMBI. It was agreed that a £2.00 supplement to be charged to all dining members at every meeting from now on.

Despite the dining supplement imposed in 2009, subscriptions had to be raised in 2010 and rose to £210.00. They were increased again the following year to £240.00 and Country Members were informed they would incur a supplement of £17.50 when dining.

In April 2012 Bro Charity Steward was pleased to be able to inform the members they had achieved Foundation Level for the Metropolitan Masonic Charities Cyberknife appeal and in 2013 became Vice Patrons. A donation of £1,460.00 was also made to the CT Scanner Appeal.

Looking ahead to its Centenary year and pursuant to a Notice of Motion, Bro Secretary proposed that *"An annual contribution of £20 be paid by each Full Member of the Lodge towards the Centenary Fund. Commencing in 2013 and until and including 2021. The contribution to be collected by an addition to the Annual Subscriptions and to be shown as a separate item on the Lodge accounts. It is not refundable and any monies not spent for Centenary purposes will be added to the Masters List for 2021"*. This proposition was carried.

Subscriptions were again increased in 2014 taking then to £270.00.

W.Bro David Kendall was presented with his 50 Year Certificate by the Deputy Metropolitan Grand Master VW.Bro Stephen Fenton at the April meeting in 2016. He had actually reached his 50th Year in October 2015. During the meeting it was announced the Lodge had obtained Foundation Status of the MMC Appeal for the "London Air Ambulance" and they were delighted to receive a lecture from W.Bro K Robson entitled "Masons as Prisoners of War".

Two candidates were initiated during 2017 and in 2018 a visit was received from the Metropolitan Grand Stewards Demonstration Team who delivered "The Abbreviated Version of the Ecclesiastical Lecture of the First Degree".

Also during 2018 W.Bro Eric Shapiro received his 50 Year Certificate from W.Bro J Powis the Metropolitan Inspector.

Attendance at meetings had fallen to an average of ten members plus a few guests. Brethren had to double up on Offices with W.Bro M Cooper being Secretary and Almoner, W.Bro S Baginsky Director of Ceremonies and Mentor, W.Bro D Purves

Charity Steward and Assistant Director of Ceremonies and Bro H Shelter Treasurer and Steward.

The start of 2019 saw more lectures "The Swinging 60's – Masonry Undone" and "Coincidence or Significance - The Mystical Number Three". Members attending had dropped to an average of eight supported by two to three guests.

The September 2019 Meeting marked a sad day for the Lodge, as Bro Secretary gave Notice of Motion that:-

"Due to a lack of numbers and no prospect of new candidates that Jeanne d'Arc Lodge No.4168 has ceased to be viable. Accordingly, the Meeting to be held at Freemasons Hall, London, WC2B 5AZ on 7th November 2019 will be considered as the last meeting of this Lodge and thereafter the affairs of the Lodge will be finally wound up and the Warrant of the Lodge, The Hall Stone Jewel and any such documents and records as are required, be returned to the MW The Grand Master.

Bro Secretary gave a further Notice of Motion that:-

"Subject to the proposal to surrender the Warrant being carried, a proposition will be made to pass a resolution to dispose of the Lodge assets."

This was followed by a discussion led by the Metropolitan Inspector W.Bro J Powis informing the brethren of the various options by which they could continue and grow. A lively discussion followed and would be discussed further at a GPC Meeting later in the month. At the following meeting Bro Secretary stated "As there is a very reasonable chance the Lodge is able to attract a significant number of joining members to make it viable, I withdraw the Propositions in my name under items 6 and 7 of the Agenda". The brethren then enjoyed a lecture entitled "The Suppression of Freemasonry".

It was later proposed by Bro Treasurer that *"Country Membership Fees be increased to £90.00. As Grand Lodge and Metropolitan Grand Lodge Fees have increased over the last 13 years (The full paying brethren have been subsidising them for this period). Furthermore, these Fees are to be remitted by 15th December 2019, or by their none payment, they will be deemed to have resigned from the Lodge on that date. In future years these Fees are to be remitted in advance by 15th December annually".*

This was Seconded by W.Bro D Purves and carried.

The first meeting of 2020 was attended by eleven members and two visitors. W.Bro Norman Roberts having been elected to serve as Master for a second year was proclaimed. Apart from W.Bro K Robson taking over as Junior Deacon everybody else remained in their respective Office. A discussion took place regarding what the brethren would do if the Lodge did fold. In an attempt to keep the camaraderie going, having always enjoyed each other company, a couple of potential Lodges were mentioned and Bro Secretary was requested to make preliminary enquires and report back.

The original Notice of Motion to close the Lodge had been rescinded. The Lodge had investigated merging with another but came away "empty handed" and efforts made by W.Bro Malcolm Cooper along with the SVO, VO and head of the Erasures / Amalgamations Department to try and find some younger members had also failed. Finally the Lodge decided to continue until its Centenary Meeting on 16th December 2020 and then close, at an Emergency Meeting to be held in January 2021. All these plans stopped when Covid-19 brought Freemasonry to a grinding halt on 17th March 2020 after the Grand Master, His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent made the following announcement.

"In view of the latest Government advice on the coronavirus pandemic, all Lodge and Chapter meetings within England and Wales are suspended for a period of four months with immediate effect".

When meetings were allowed to resume due to the ongoing Pandemic and Brethren not wishing to travel into London arrangements were being made to hold the last two meetings of the Lodge at the Harrow District Masonic Centre. Applications had been submitted to obtain dispensations from both Metropolitan Grand Lodge and the Province of Middlesex. "That the amount standing in the sole Lodge bank account of the Benevolent fund with Santander at the time of the bank account closure shall be donated via Grand Charity to one or more of the Metropolitan Appeals to be chosen by the Trustees of the Benevolent Fund."

"That instructions shall be given to the Relief Chest, that the amount held by it on behalf of the Lodge, shall be donated, as to be determined by the Trustees"

The meeting was held in Terry's dining room with the Tyler taking position in the kitchen. Lodge of Instruction

In the autumn of 1921 it was decided to form a Lodge of Instruction and several meetings took place to discuss this. The final meeting was held at the Devonshire Arms Public House and Hotel, Denman Street, London on 18th November 1921. The Proprietor Bro W R Taylor was present having recently become a member of the Lodge. The committee deemed that the room at the Devonshire Arms would be an entirely satisfactory place to hold the Lodge of Instruction. The question of Lodge Furniture for the room was to be considered at a later date once the LOI had become firmly established. W.Bro Richardson was proposed as Preceptor, W.Bro Jeffreys as Treasurer and Bro Pallet as Secretary. All three propositions were carried unanimously. A joining fee of 2/6d and a 1/s fee per attendance were agreed.

Bro Taylor generously placed the room at the disposal of the Lodge of Instruction without charge. The meeting night was to be discussed and agreed in Open Lodge.

The Lodge of Instruction got off to a very good start as the Officers and members were keen to expand their Masonic knowledge. The original Working Tools used by No.5 France were loaned to the Lodge of Instruction.

In 1925 it moved to the Lakes Restaurant Great Tower Street and in 1927 to the Mitre Hotel, Duke Street Hill, London Bridge. It continued to meet here until meetings ceased at the outbreak of war in 1939.

Lodge of Instruction resumed in January 1945, at the Kings Arms, Public House, John Street, W.C.1 and continued here until 1969 when it transferred briefly to the Enterprise Tavern, Haverstock Hill, N.W.3., before moving to the Roebuck Public House, Kings Road, Chelsea in September 1970.

During the 70's and 80's Lodge of Instruction changed venues four more times. After only four months at the Roebuck it moved to the Sugar Loaf Public House in Great Queen Street, staying here for nearly seven years before relocating to the Old Ivy Public House, 116 Goswell Road, EC1. After three years it moved to The Abbey Community Association at 29 Marsham St, SW1, and then in 1984 to the Three Tuns Public House in Chancery Lane, EC1.

Information about the Lodge of Instruction disappeared off the summons in 1986 and was replaced with a notice stating "*Details of the Lodge of Instruction can be obtained from W.Bro G Plastow*".

As more and more of the senior brethren either passed away or moved away from London, it was not feasible to hold a regular LOI. Instead an informal School of Instruction was held at the business premises of one of the members. This started on a regular basis, but as more brethren moved away it became difficult to hold meaningful practices on a weekly basis, so over time it became just a couple rehearsals in the weeks leading up to a meeting. Eventually all forms of a regular LOI ceased and a rehearsal before the meetings became the normal practice.

Hall Stone Lodge of the Masonic Million Memorial Fund

In January 1920 details of a campaign were launched to raise funds for a new building. The name of this fund was the Masonic Million Memorial Fund and its aim, to raise £1 Million. The new building was to be called the Masonic Memorial Peace Building, as a lasting memorial to those brethren who made the "Supreme Sacrifice" in the First World War and would also serve as the headquarters for Freemasonry, replacing the existing building on Great Queen Street.

At the regular meeting held on 25th March 1921, it was decided to try to qualify. Individual members who contributed 10 guineas to the fund would be entitled to receive a silver medal and those who gave 100 guineas a gold medal. Lodges that contributed an average of 10 guineas per member would be known as Hall Stone Lodges and the Master of each, entitled to wear the medal as a collaret. By the end of the appeal in 1938, 53,224 individual medals had been issued and 1,321 Lodges had qualified as Hall Stone Lodges.



A Festival was held at Olympia on 8th August 1925 at which the Grand Master was joined by 7,000 Freemasons. A special jewel was given to all those who took part in this event.

Six Past Masters and eleven other brethren as Stewards represented Jeanne d'Arc Lodge at this Festival, which is still the largest catered meal ever to be served in Europe. The Menu of which can be seen on the next page.

Venues where Jeanne d'Arc Lodge has met

Hotel Cecil, Strand 1920 – 1921, 1922 -1925, 1927 – 1931

Built in 1896 the Hotel Cecil was at one time the largest hotel in London with over 800 rooms. It was largely demolished in 1930 and Shell Max House was built on the site. The facade still remains and is now occupied by shops and Offices.

A large Palestine Arab delegation took over the hotel in 1921 protesting against the proposal of the British mandate for Palestine. This could be the reason the Lodge left for a year.



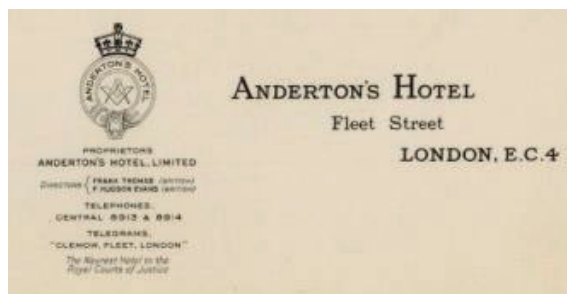

Anderton's Hotel, 164 Fleet Street 1921 – 1922

Built on the site of the Horn Tavern.

The original hotel building was demolished in 1939 and is now Shops and Offices. Their headed notepaper displayed the Square and Compass



Comedy Restaurant, Panton Street 1925 – 1927



This Restaurant was next door to the Royal Comedy Theatre, now the Harold Pinter Theatre.

Northumberland Rooms, Northumberland Avenue 1931 – 1947

These rooms were possibly part of the Victoria Hotel built in 1887.

Partly taken over by the War Office in 1940 and brought outright by them in 1947 and renamed Northumberland House. The building was sold to the London School of Economics in 2006. Part of the building is used as accommodation for the students, whilst another portion of the building, including the historic lobby has been turned back into a hotel, "The Grand at Trafalgar Square"



Great Queen Street 1947 – present



Having moved here after the closure of the Northumberland Rooms, the Lodge has met at Freemasons Hall ever since. Since moving to Great Queen Street dining has taken place at:-

- Del Re Restaurant, Kingsway
